#### **Education**

Collective Journey storytelling communication campaign; community forums; home testing videos; materials for health care providers to build trust; narrative circles; research interpreter training, Long COVID ambassador training, medical curriculum for trustworthiness

## **VACCINATIONS**

- Vaccination events/pop-up sites in partnership with Boston Medical Center (BMC) and schools
- Supports Boston Public Health Commission to provide services in conjunction with vaccine sites
- Vulnerability index to target vaccination sites







### **COMMUNITY EDUCATORS**

- Three ambassadors for the Community Engagement Core
- Long COVID Ambassador Training including 5 training modules to help link community members to Long COVID care
- Partnered with Boston Medical Center Clinical Research network to educate community youth about careers in research and clinical trials

## **CLINICAL TRIALS RECRUITMENT**

- MA CEAL team members are principal investigators for several COVID-19 trials (ACTIV-6 and RECOVER)
- Interpreter Services Training provides informed consent training for medical interpreters
- Photo elicitation of barriers to clinical trials participation
- Supporting NIH RECOVER recruitment both at BMC and around Boston
- Partnering with BMC to recruit to RECOVER neuro

## **Community assessment**

- Qualitative rapid assessment of existing data
- Population: African American, Haitian (recent immigrants), and Latino/a
- Statewide online/phone survey of MA adults with oversample for Black and Latino focused on participation in research
- 'We Got Us' Youth for Youth Survey with youth researchers involved in all aspects of the survey
- Restorative justice circles with qualitative analysis of narratives shared

- National Long COVID survey with oversample of Black and Latino
